Marine Wing Communications Squadron 38 Commanding Officer LtCol Atiim O. Phillips



LtCol Atiim Phillips, from Chesapeake, VA, enlisted in the Virginia Army National Guard in 1994. He graduated Basic Training and Advanced Infantry Training in Aug 1995 and reported to 1/116th, 29th INF DIV (L), in Christiansburg, VA. He was released from his contract in 1999 due to being accepted into Marine Corps OCS.

LtCol Phillips graduated from Virginia Tech in 1998 with a BA in Interdisciplinary Studies. He commissioned via the OCC program on 13 Aug 1999. Upon completion of The Basic School and Communications Information Systems Officer Course, he

reported to 8th Communication Bn, II MEF, in Camp Lejeune, NC.

From Aug 2000 to Oct 2001, Lt Phillips served as Alpha Co Radio Platoon Commander, Bravo Co Executive, Operations Officer and the lead communications planner for Direct Support Company, planning the activation of 4th MEB (AT). In Feb 2004, he deployed with 22D MEU (SOC) LF6F 1-04 as the Joint Task Force Enabler Det OIC to Tarin Kowt, Afghanistan ISO Operation ENDURING FREEDOM (OEF) and established FOB Ripley.

In 2004, Capt Phillips reported to the Defense Information Systems Agency (DISA) in Falls Church, VA. At DISA, Capt Phillips worked with the Global Information Grid Engineering Services Directorate as the Assistant Lead SIPRNET Engineer and Lead IP Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) Engineer. In Feb 2007, he received his MS, Information Systems Management from the University of Phoenix. Upon completion of his tour in 2007, he was selected for Expeditionary Warfare School (EWS) in Quantico, VA.

In 2008, Capt Phillips received orders to Marine Wing Communications Squadron 38 (MWCS-38). He activated and served as the Commanding Officer, Detachment C from Oct 2008 to Nov 2009. He was frocked to Major and served as the Squadron Executive Officer until Nov 2010. He deployed as the 3d MAW (FWD) Deputy AC/S G-6 and G-6 Operations Officer at Camp Leatherneck, Afghanistan ISO OEF 10.2.

In 2011, Maj Phillips executed orders to Communications School, Quantico, VA. He served as Course Coordinator for the Basic and Advanced Instruction Groups. He lead the Course Chief and Chief Instructor for the Advanced Communications Officer Course (ACOC), Warrant Officer Communication Courses (WCC), and the Basic Communications Officer Course (BCOC) for one year.

In 2014, Maj Phillips attended Marine Corps Command and Staff College where he received a Masters in Military Studies. In June 2015, he transitioned to the MAGTF Staff Training Program Division, Quantico, VA.

In 2016, LtCol Phillips was promoted to his current grade and executed orders to Okinawa, Japan. He served as Assistant Chief of Staff G-6, 3d Marine Expeditionary Brigade/ Task Force-76 for two years.

In 2018, LtCol Phillips executed orders to Marine Corps Cyberspace Operations Group in Quantico, VA where he served as the Executive Officer for three years.

On 10 Jun 2021, LtCol Phillips assumed command of Marine Wing Communications Squadron 38, Marine Air Control Group 38, 3d Marine Aircraft Wing, MCAS Miramar, CA.

COMMAND PHILOSOPHY

- **Great teams do the fundamental things well**. I need each Marine to know and care about their fundamental requirements. Leaders are expected to maximize the individual capabilities of their Marines and employ them as a team. We will always achieve more together than as individuals.

MWCS-38 HISTORY

Marine Wing Communications Squadron 38 was activated on 1 September 1967 as Squadron 3 assigned to Marine Wing Headquarters Group 3, 3D Marine Aircraft Wing. On 1 July 1971, the squadron was redesignated as Marine Wing Communications Squadron 38 and assigned to Marine Air Control Group 38, 3D Marine Aircraft Wing.



For most of the mid 70's and 80's, the

squadron's deployment schedule centered around Exercise Palm Tree and Gallant Knight/Gallant Eagle, and Weapons and Tactics Instructor Courses. On 29 April 1987, the squadron reorganized into a headquarters element and two communications detachments, Detachment A and Detachment B. This reorganization enabled the squadron to provide communications support for the ACE of two Marine Air Ground Task Forces (MAGTF) deployed simultaneously. In the late 80's, Display Determination, Kernel Blitz, Freedom Banner, RIMPAC, Combined Arms Exercise (CAX), and Roving Sands were added to the exercise schedule.



In August 1990, the Squadron Command Element and Detachment A deployed to Southwest Asia in support of MAG-70 for OPERATION DESERT SHIELD. Over the next four months, this initial echelon grew when augmented by an MWCS-18 Detachment from Hawaii and Detachment B, MWCS-28 from New River, North Carolina, while Marine aviation forces grew to almost two wings. At the peak of OPERATION DESERT STORM,

MWCS-38 supported four fully functional Marine Air Bases, a Tactical Air Command Centers (TACC), a Tactical Air Operations Center (TAOC), an Early Warning Control (EWC) center, an Aviation Logistics Ship, two Forward Arming and Refueling Points (FARP), and two relay sites.

In December 1992, MWCS-38 was once again called upon to provide expeditionary communications support during a crisis, this time for OPERATION RESTORE HOPE in Somalia. MWCS-38 deployed two operational detachments in support of a designated Marine Aviation Combat Element (ACE) in a historic humanitarian relief effort.



In March 2003, MWCS-38 deployed to Southwest Asia once again, this time in support of OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM. For the next five years, a continuous detachment(+) sized communications squadron element supported the ACE and combat operations in Iraq.



In January 2008, MWCS-38 deployed its last detachment-sized element to Southwest Asia in support of OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM. This deployment saw the deactivation of the last Unit Level Circuit Switch tactical telephone switch in the Iraqi theater of operations, completing the cutover of all telephone services to commercial lines.

In October 2008, MWCS-38 relinquished communications control to 9th Communications Battalion aboard Al Asad Airbase, Iraq, as the 3D Marine Aircraft Wing's footprint in Iraq was significantly reduced.

In March 2010, MWCS-38 once again deployed a detachment-sized unit to Southwest Asia, this time to Afghanistan, in support of OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM. For over two years, MWCS-38 supported combat operations and made significant accomplishments such as the installation of the communications architecture for a new flight line at Camp Leatherneck, as well as the commercialization of Kandahar Airfield. Detachment A returned from Afghanistan in August 2012 as the last large MWCS-38 presence. At present, MWCS-38 continues to support OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM with augmented supporting elements.

Since March 2013, MWCS-38 has continuously supported MAG-50 with detachment(-) sized deployments to the Kingdom of Bahrain, and continues to prepare for future contingencies through participation in training exercises back home.



Marines are encouraged to contact UVAs first to have the full range of confidential options available to them if they have been sexually assaulted or believe they have been sexually assaulted.

The two reporting options available to Marines are:

<u>Unrestricted Reporting</u>: Allows a Marine who is sexually assaulted to report the assault and receive support, advocacy, medical treatment, and counseling with a law enforcement investigation and the support of the Chain of Command.

<u>Restricted Reporting</u>: Allows a Marine who is sexually assaulted to confidentially report the assault and receive support, advocacy, medical treatment, and counseling without a law enforcement investigation or command involvement.
